A quick look at new and changed items for the coming season



Euphorbia Breathless - A new line of Euphorbia this one grows much like Diamond Frost, but Breathless Blush is a dark leaved pink flowered plant that adds a new dimension to this popular plant type.

Pseuderanthemum – An upright foliage plant with large leaves, three colors Black, Green, and Tri Color. Sun and heat loving this plant is also drought tolerant.

Salvia Argentea – Another foliage plant this is one has large fuzzy silver leaves. This is a great plant choice to provide contrast in landscape plantings and combination pots.

Streptocarpus Ladyslippers – A low light plant choice that provides flower power to shade areas.

Mandeville Sun Parasol – A great climbing plant that will provide large blooms to any full sun area, patios, and decks would be a great area for this plant. We plant these in one gallon pots that have a trellis attached to them. Three colors will be available; Crimson, Red, and White.

Cordylena – A dracaena plant that gives the height, and color, available in two colors.

Ipomoea Illusion Lace – Very fine maple shaped leaves give this Ipomoea a distinct look. A more compact grower than traditional Ipomoea this variety will be a great choice for combination plantings as it will not take over the pot. Two colors Emerald, and Black.





Lobularia Snow Princess – Commonly called Alyssum Lobularia Snow Princess is a non seed producing plant that is a phenomenal introduction to the plant market. Snow Princess produces a blanket of white flowers all year long. This plant is extremely aggressive; take care when used in combination pots, because this plant is so aggressive it does not play well with others.

Pretty Much Picasso, Supertunia – This unique plant catches the attention of everyone that sees it. A limited issue item Pretty Much Picasso is only available to growers who participate in the Proven Winner branded pot program, Bartels Plants will have a good supply.



A few changes for Spring 2010

4" Specialty Annuals – We have moved many items that were previously grown in 4 ½" pots into 4" Pots, this will make these items less expensive and easier to use in large plantings.

Vegetables and Herbs – We will be growing these in biodegradable coir pots which can be planted directly into the soil.
